- Strong research and collaboration structures already in place
 - Mutually beneficial democratic representation structures
 - Multiple networks for research and collaboration
- Lack of state-sponsored platform for policy engagement
 - Politicisation of women's issues

UK women's organisations

- Funding issues
 - The austerity double-whammy
 - The result: reduced political participation

Only 6% of women's VCOs have over a year's funding in reserve.

The impact of Brexit upon women

- ► Economic concerns
 - Low-income women most vulnerable
- Roll-back in anti-discrimination rights
- Loss of European collaboration on women's and gender equality issues
 - Upcoming directives
 - Shared expertise

Women's organisations: a knock-on effect?

- Economic
 - Greater numbers of dependents
 - ► Funding implications?
- Nuance-poverty
 - Minority rights
 - Reduced salience to women's rights issues within Parliament and government departments
- Loss of collaboration and expertise
 - ► Loss of revenue?
 - Representation

What do women's organisations need?

- Platform within British government to replace WNC for government consultation with women's charities and experts
- Guaranteed position at the European Women's Lobby
- Continued and enhanced infrastructure for sharing of expertise and initiatives
